The Salesian Society is one of the largest orders of the Catholic Church that provides education and human development programmes for the poor, disadvantaged and abandoned children and youth across the world.

Don Bosco Networks Tanzania (DBNET), which runs the Salesian Society's Development Programme in Tanzania, was founded in 1992 as a procurement office before transforming into a Project Office in 1996. In 2014, the office received a Charter and become autonomous from the Kenya office assuming its current name DBNET.

OUR APPROACH


DBNET coordinates the Salesian development work by advising, evaluating, planning and managing projects across Tanzania to achieve sustainable development.

OUR PROGRAMMES

1. Youth Animation

Youth Animation Programmes build the confidence and resilience young people need to set and achieve their goals. Don Bosco's Youth Animation Programme seeks to build the characters of youth intellectually, physically, morally and spiritually.

The animation programmes were developed to bridge the gaps in the current education system to ensure youths grow in a balanced manner in the society. DBNET uses different activities to animate the youth such as life skills training, peer education and talent development through cultural activities such as drama, music, and dance. Other activities carried out at the centres include personal talent development through cultural activities such as drama and dance as well as sports such as basketball, soccer, volleyball, netball and karate.

2. OVC Programme

Orphans and vulnerable children (OVC) are susceptible to physiological, psychological and social problems. They face difficulties that need immediate attention. Don Bosco's OVC and Children in Need Programme targets marginalised poor children and youth aged eight to 18 years, who easily drift into the streets, out of school because of the challenges they face at home.

Bunju Children's Project serves the everincreasing number of children in need from Dar es Salaam and neighbouring towns. The project aims at giving hope to disadvantaged children by giving them formal education, counselling, rehabilitation and psychosocial support. This way, they are prepared for future and reintegration into society.

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3. EDUCATION

Don Bosco's three areas of intervention in education are primary, secondary and vocational training. This is because education is the minimum entitlement for equipping youth with knowledge and skills they need for a decent future.

PRIMARY EDUCATION:

Don Bosco Network, in collaboration with Profuturo foundation through the financial support of (Fundación Telefónica and the "la Caixa" Banking Foundation) has launched the digital education programme in Tanzania. The main objective of the programme is to reduce the educational gap in the country by providing quality digital education to children from vulnerable environments in Sub-Saharan Africa- Tanzania. The strategic objective of the intervention is to promote equal opportunities through high quality education for all boys and girls of age 4-14 years enrolled in primary schools, using locally-deployed digital tools, learning content/platform as well as on-going

training and support for teachers in all the selected schools/regions. The project is based on educational model of XXI century competencies and innovative teaching methodologies.

SECONDARY EDUCATION:

Don Bosco runs three secondary schools, namely Dodoma, Mafinga and Didia seminaries. All the schools are oriented towards imparting knowledge to students and preparing those with a vocation in the seminaries for priesthood. The schools follow Tanzania's 2-7-4-2-3 education system that stretches from pre-primary to university.

Vocational training attracts young men and women of 15 to 28 years, seeking selfreliance skills through Technical Vocational Education Training. Most of them are primary school dropouts, who either lacked support to join secondary school or who have finished secondary education but are unable to study further due to financial constraints. Others lacked skills to be selfemployed.Don Bosco's three Vocational Training Centres (VTCs) in Iringa, Dodoma and Dar es Salaam has prioritised social and professional integration of Tanzania's youth. The centres enrol youths from disadvantaged backgrounds to equip them with skills for self-reliance

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Solar Training And Installation Project:

The Solar Training and Installation Project is the latest project developed through the support of Misereor from the German government to train vulnerable youths on basics of solar electricity, design of solar PV systems as well as installation and maintenance at Don Bosco VTC Oyster Bay. The partnership has led to equipping SE workshop with tools, training materials and equipment enough to train 120 students every year.

Don Bosco has also partnered with Selco India and Mott Foundation from the United States. The partnerships will see the establishment of training laboratories in Dodoma and Iringa to promote the use of renewable energy in conserving a clean envitonment for Tanzania.

4. The Quest For Quality Learning In VTCs

A major challenge facing vocational training is lack of qualified instructors, resulting from poor preparation at college. This has led to poor quality graduates. It's against this background that Don Bosco will be starting a Vocational Teachers Training Colleges for students and technical instructors in Dodoma & Arusha. The college will offer courses in Welding and Fabrication, Motor Vehicle Mechanics, Electrical, Carpentry, Masonry and Plumbing, ICT, Tourism and Hospitality.

LEARNING MOMENTS FOR INSTRUCTORS

Instructors will have short stints at various industries related to their specialisation. The learning moments will be meant to enable the instructors identify gaps in the syllabus and match them with labour market demands. The industrial visitations by instructors is aimed at improving training skills in their areas of work and is expected to improve delivery of lessons and quality of TVET training.

5. EMPLOYMENT ORIENTATION

Don Bosco's lob Placement Office (IPO) with funding from VIA Don Bosco, through the Belgium Cooperation Development, have been running a programme to propel youth to decent work. Through partnerships with the government, private enterprises, and other partners, the JPO empowers youth to realise their full potential by giving them skills and connecting them with potential employers. The JPO have signed MoU's with companies where graduates are attached to gain experience before being absorbed into the labour market either as self-employed or paid workers. Besides, they are exposed to entrepreneurship opportunities and connected to micro-finance institutions for start-up capital. The office also offers career guidance, and English lessons to help in improving their communication skills.

6. Production Units

Don Bosco's vocational students are offered on-job training at its Workshop Production Units, where they gain practical experience to enhance their skills before joining the labour market. In order to meet the training costs, proceeds from products made at the units are ploughed back to supplement school fees and donations from well-wishers. Besides running as businesses to beef up VTCs' finance base to seal the funding shortfall, production units also double as educational tools to help improve learning quality by using businesses as platforms for skills development.
